It's history in the making!! With the future in mind, the HICC has recently purchased the 2.5 acres surrounding the community hall. This was a big decision, but one that promises many rewards for our community. The purchase price of \$9,300 was not to be considered lightly and required a commitment from each and every island property owner. A plea to the community was sent out in August to as many property owners as could be reached and as we write this newsletter, our Treasurer has just made the final payment. The land is now ours! This is an accomplishment for which we can all truly be proud. This is the kind of community support that makes Harstine famous. All future donations to this special fund will benefit the development phase of this project. There are lots of ideas being formulated and foremost on every list is increased parking. The Property Acquisition and Development Committee (chaired by Reid Mitchell and now called the Property Development Committee), will be working through these various plans and be reporting their progress at the HICC monthly meetings. Another committee is sparking back to life and will be making its mark on history, too. It's none other than the investigative Island Resource Committee this year chaired by Randy Price. This group made tremendous strides in recent years educating us about the island itself via the award-winning Island Resource Book. Now it's time to take that wealth of information and decide where to go from here. This will prove to be a timely issue because of the State's passage of House Bill 2929 which states, in general, that Mason County WILL develop a growth management plan. How Harstine Island will fit into this growth management plan is the task of the Island Resource Committee. Therefore, this committee will be asking for a lot of input over the next few months. The Building committee (now called the Building & Maintenance Committee chairman - Joe Klein) has installed the long awaited cooking island in the kitchen. The Women's Club purchased the cupboards and Joe/Marge Klein worked on the installation. The cupboards are beautiful, and the tiled counter top is a sight to behold. This spacious new counter really speeds up serving for large gatherings/dinners and the overall layout helps direct the line of hungry people at our many community potlucks! This last remaining piece of the puzzle really completes our picture-perfect kitchen. The everfaithful Al Bacon has also been working some long hours to upgrade the electrical capabilities of the hall. And not to be left out is our favorite Sunshine Committee. Also of community interest, are the informative reports from our liason, John Strasburger, who represents Harstine on the Sheriff's Advisory Board. John keeps the lines of communication open between the community and the Sheriff's office and reports at each HICC meeting. Onto the festivities....The HICC hosted it's annual Fall "October-fest Wurst Dinner" for the entire community with approximately 100 people in attendance. Also honored were Martin Goetsch and irvie Wingert, posthumously, and Shirl Larson, as recipients of this year's "Service to the Community" award. Another success story was the annual all-island Spaghetti dinner in May that served 15 gallons of sauce, 48 lbs of noodles and 37 loaves of bread to about 300 people! With so many important island project's this year, like expansion of the parking lot and growth management/water quality studies, this dinner is a prime opportunity for you to support these efforts. And to top the day off, Justine Angster (nee Goetsch) and kitchen crew also offered fresh homemade donuts. Next on the agenda is the preparation for their annual plant sale. Club members are sprouting (literally) lots of herbs, flowers, ground covers, etc., so plan to stop by the Hall on May 4 from 9-noon and bring some Spring home with you! Once Spring does hit, this same group will again be spending Saturday mornings from 10-noon sponsoring the "Farmers' Market". In addition to local artisans with their wares, the club members sell quite an array of fresh produce from their very own Harstine Island gardens!

Harstine Ladies are busier than ever with outings, luncheons, donations and dedication! One of this year's highlights included the Harvest Breakfast & Rummage Sale which served about 125 people. The proceeds were donated to the Mason General Hospital Lifeline program, and will support 2 units for 1 year. This group also hosted a luncheon honoring Wilma George, our island's local mail carrier, who retired after many years of dedicated service. The ladies also have many fond memories of this year's Holiday House Arts & Crafts Fair. This one was especially memorable for the power outage which hit about 20 minutes after opening and lasted until about 15 minutes before closing. With the aide of flash lights and hurricane lanterns it was business as usual for these hardy islanders (except for the hot soup & coffee which had to be taken from the menu). As mentioned earlier, these same ladies purchased the new kitchen cupboards for the cooking island in the hall and deserve a big THANK YOU for keeping the upkeep and upgrading of the community hall high on their list of priorities. The major fund raisers that support these projects are sales from their Harstine Island sweatshirts, T-shirts and hats, and from their entertaining book The Island Remembers.

The show must go on.....and boy did it! ......by none other than our own Harstine Island Theater Club who presented two shows in 1990. This was all under the illumination of the new professional stage lighting system purchased by the group this past year. The Vaudeville in July was entitled "Northwest Fare" and included "flashback" skits covering the last century.
