#### Harstine Island Community Club Annual Newsletter

This newsletter is published by the HARSTINE ISLAND COMMUNITY CLUB. An incorporated, non-profit organization. The COMMUNITY CLUB works to improve or maintain the quality of life on the Island and to serve as a vehicle for addressing Island business in an integrated and democratic manner.

The COMMUNITY CLUB hosted a number of informative presentations at its monthly meetings throughout 1992. The Harstine Island Planning Board was formed. The attached letter and questionnaire provides further detail. In February, the by-laws were changed. The executive board was expanded to include two members at large. The parking lot was leveled and pit run gravel added. The Club obtained a part-time caretaker. The annual Island cleanup sponsored by the Island Youth Club on April 25 was successfully completed. The annual spaghetti dinner, held in May, saw a large Island turnout. The annual Octoberfest dinner presented Lorna Hink as the "Person of the Year." Four awards were made for "Honored Citizen of the Year:" Jacob and Rosetta Wingert, Laura Brakebill and Kay Braget. The new Harstine based cookbook *Just Among Friends* containing hundreds of choice recipes, stories and facts written by Gerri Lewis and Marge Klein is now in print. Copies may be obtained from Gerri Lewis at 426-4120, Jarrell's Cove Marina, Harstine Gallery and at Benn Pottery. All proceeds go to the Community Club. The environmental study *Forest Resources and Critical Areas of Harstine Island* is available through Damon LeJune at 426-0494. There is a limited supply.

The GARDEN CLUB had a year of successful activities. The Apple Squeeze produced more than 200 gallons of tasty cider from three presses and many volunteers hard at work. In 1993, the annual plant sale will be held on Saturday, May 8, featuring flowering and vegetable bedding plants, herbs, shrubs, strawberries, caneberries, grapes and houseplants. Coffee and plant care advice will also be available. The Farmer's Market starts in early June. All are welcome to sell fruits, vegetables and crafts on Saturdays from 10:00 AM to noon across the road from the Community Hall. The annual Apple Squeeze this fall will again feature fresh squeezed cider by the gallon, cups of hot spiced cider, doughnuts, coffee and candies apples, all produced at the Hall by many volunteers ranging from children to grandparents. The GARDEN CLUB's informal meetings welcome everyone, Islanders or not, on the 2nd Thursday of every month at 7:00 PM in the Hall. On occasion they meet at a member's home or garden.

The HARSTINE ISLAND WOMEN'S CLUB meets at the Community Hall on the first Thursday of each month. Brown bag lunch meetings begin at noon and all women on the Island are welcome to come as guests or to be

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members. The activities of the Club are two-fold: fund-raising for benefit of the community and of the Island, and second for socializing, fun and friendship. Spring and Christmas luncheons are held in May and December respectively. Flea Markets, Rummage Sales and a Pancake Breakfast rounded out the charitable fund collection activities. This year saw contributions made to Mason General Hospital Lifeline, South Sound Hospice, two Shelton Food Banks and the Olympic College Building Fund. Officers are: President Pat LeClair, Vice President Adella Ashbaugh, Secretary Margaret Loughlin and Treasurer Lucy Dike.

The THEATRE CLUB meets for a potluck dinner and meeting at 6:00 PM on the last Monday of each month. Anyone interested please come. All performances were to a packed house. A similar schedule is expected in 1993.

The HARSTINE GRANGE continued to maintain the highest standards by again achieving First Place at the Mason County Fair for their grange display. A trophy was presented acknowleging this outstanding performance over the previous eight years. Five hundred dollars was contributed to the Olympic College Fund in 1993 the the HARSTINE GRANGE. Dear Property Owner,

Early in 1992, the Harstine Island Community Club formed the Harstine Island Planning Board to develop a plan regarding future growth on the Island. Specifically, the Community Club directed the board to develop a plan to:

- · Protect water quality and quantity.
- Maintain the rural character of the Island.
- Protect private rights.
- Provide a legal basis for plan enforcement.

Harstine Island is currently divided into approximately 2,200 parcels most of which are privately owned. There are about 600 residences on the Island, both full and part-time. Of the 19-square mile total land area, approximately 60% is currently classified as "Forest Land." Only three miles of privately-owned shoreline remains undeveloped.

From 1980-90, Mason County's population grew at an average rate of 2.3 percent per year. From 1990-92, it grew at 3.7 percent per year.

During the past year, we have been investigating options to best plan for future growth. We have concluded that we should develop a Sub-Area Plan as part of the Mason County Comprehensive Plan. A Sub-Area Plan, when adopted by the Mason County commissioners, will contain the policies related to managing growth on the Island.

As a volunteer board, it is our objective to develop a plan that reflects the desires of the majority of Island property owners. Accordingly, we will be spending a great deal of time this year talking with you and learning your views. Our first effort is the attached questionnaire.

Please complete and return it to the address noted above as soon as possible. Your response will be held in confidence and will assist us in preparing a plan that will be acceptable to our community.
