Harstine Island Neighborhood Watch operates on our island to support local and state law enforcement units by observing activities that might involve criminal behavior or endanger the public. It also seeks to encourage "good neighboring" by providing service to individuals in the sense of "keeping an eye on things."

While Neighborhood Watch is a national organization and activity, Harstine Island's is locally based and locally administered through 100% volunteer efforts. Its primary activities involve daily patrols of island roads, forwarding information to law enforcement agencies regarding possible criminal or dangerous behavior, organizing neighborhoods to patrol and/or observe their local area, and occasionally inviting guest speakers to inform the public regarding criminal or dangerous circumstances.

The organization meets at the Community Hall at 7:00 P.M. the 3rd Wednesday of each month. You are invited to attend. You might like to serve as a patrol volunteer one day per month, as a neighborhood coordinator, as an officer of the organization or in other ways. The Watch is entirely supported by contributions from individuals and organizations on the island, and invites contributions.


maintain the various garden projects around the Community Hall, or discussing new ideas for meetings.

Fire District #5

During 2002, fire fighters operating the two volunteer stations on Harstine Island responded to 76 calls - eleven less than 2001. The statistics are:

13 Level 1 Medical (minor), 8 Level 2 Medical (serious), 26 Level 3 Medical (urgent), 13 Motor Vehicle Accidents (which includes two fatalities), 5 Fires (mostly off island responses), 7 Burn Complaint/Smoke Investigations and 1 Service Call.

We will have four new Recruits in the 2003 County Fire Training Academy in Jan. They are Colleen Benson, Nick Arthur, and Steve and DeeAnn Meachem. They will spend the better part of the next six months learning different aspects of fire and medical emergency response. Fire District 5 is always looking for volunteers. If you are interested in helping, please contact District Headquarters at 426-5533.

District 5 services 150 square miles in Mason County with 11 stations, two of which have a Paramedic and EMT response crew 24 hours a day. Another station serves as District HQ, Communication Center (FIRECOM) and administrative office. Mason 5 is ready to assist you and is committed to providing the best possible service with well-trained and dedicated personnel.

District 5 offers several services to help educate and prepare the community for emergencies. These include:

Address markers to clearly mark your residence for responders (minimal fee and free installation),

Home Safety Inspections to help you identify fire and other safety hazards (inspections free),

CPR and First Aid Training to train you in basic life saving measures (minimal cost), and a

Reference File the district maintains concerning residents with special medical needs and Fire Pre-Plans of commercial and some residential buildings.

Members of Fire District 5 are also members of Mason 5 fire fighters Association, a nonprofit, charitable organization, which along with career staff local union, contribute their time, efforts and funding for various equipment and station needs along with helping those in need within the fire service and within the community.

Harstine Island Theatre Foundation Update

The Foundation continues to move ahead, albeit slowly, towards achieving its mission to develop a facility on the island. Over the years, as a practical matter, the foundation has broadened its vision beyond merely providing a larger theatre. As there is no facility on the island or in Mason County that fosters both performing and learning about the arts, we hope this facility can ultimately serve that broader purpose. Additionally, it is becoming clearer that such a facility, if properly conceived, might well serve other community functions that cannot be accommodated at the existing Community Hall. While not fully flushed out, this could conceivably include after school child accommodations, senior exercise programs, etc. Pioneer School District is supportive of having a location nearby where kids would be exposed to the arts as funding constraints assure this cannot happen elsewhere. Additionally, a survey of theatre attendees at the community clubhouse indicated overwhelming support for what the Foundation is trying to accomplish. Presently the Foundation is working with Mason County to acquire some state park lands on the island that would be adequate to accommodate the envisioned facility and include a small picnic area. We hope to acquire the site in 2003. Lastly, the Foundation is looking for volunteers willing to roll up their sleeves to help make this vision come true.
