
Several folks are deserving of special recognition and kudos for jobs well done. Colleen Benson served as Sunshine Chair,

#### 2005 FIRE DISTRICT 5

As of December 15<sup>th</sup>, Mason 5 island volunteers responded to 89 calls, down slightly from last years 101 calls. There were 64 medical calls (illness or injury), 13 fire calls (includes brush fires, smoke investigations, and burn complaints), 9 motor vehicle accidents, and 3 service calls (citizen assists).

Gary and Lorna Hink hung up their bunker gear and aid bag after 21 years of volunteer service to District 5 and Harstine Island. The Fire District, Fire Fighter's Association and Harstine Community Club honored and thanked them earlier this year. They touched many lives throughout their careers and will be missed on calls and at drills.

This year we hosted the first Community Emergency Response Team (CERT) training at the hall, with 18 islanders participating in the three day disaster preparedness and response training program. Attendees learned basic first aid, triage, search and rescue, fire extinguisher use, and other disaster preparedness measures. District 5 also sponsored an 8 hour first aid class for Harstine Point Association. This training event was also well attended.

Fire fighter Jon Gorman was promoted to Lieutenant and will work as Station Officer at Station 9. Jon has spent nearly 4 months in Mississippi providing relief to hurricane victims, and is still there at time of writing this report.

The island has an all volunteer staff, with full-time paid staff on the mainland to support them. Station 9 (next to the Community Club) houses an engine and a basic life support ambulance. Station 11 (near Island Shores Road) has one engine and one brush truck.

District 5 covers 150 square miles of central Mason Co., with 10 stations, two of which are staffed 24/7 with a paramedic fire fighter and EMT fire fighter crew. Another station serves as district HQ and is also the communication center (Firecom) as well as administrative office. Mason 5's well trained and dedicated personnel are committed to providing its citizens with the best possible service. Some special services to educate and prepare for emergencies include:

Address Markers- Help clearly mark your residences for responders Home Safety Inspections- Help identify fire and other safety hazards CPR and First Aid training –Basic life saving measures taught Reference File- Maintains files listing special needs or medications

Mason 5 members are also members of Mason 5 Fire Fighters' Association, a nonprofit charitable organization which contributes time, effort, and funding to benefit their department and their community by providing various equipment and station needs, and providing support to those in need in the community. *Nick Neuerburg*

#### **Bridge Community Church**

What a wonderful community we have on Harstine and what a privilege to reside here. One of the best things is we can worship our Lord Sunday mornings with our neighbors and fellow islanders and never leave the island. We have an active group that keeps busy, makes close friendships and serves our Lord, plus shares with others.

Of course, there is always a 9:30 Sunday school for adults, teens and children, followed by our 10:30 worship service. Communion is the first Sunday of the month. We also have Wednesday night prayer meetings in someone's home, and a monthly potluck dinner after church. Our youth groups have activity nights twice monthly. During the summer we have Youth Bible Camps and a week long Daily Vacation Bible School for youngsters, with a picnic for everybody. Spring and fall bring youth retreats. Last year we had picnics at Mason Lake and the Allison's home. Baptismal services are held at Spencer Lake, which is a bit warmer than the waters surrounding our island. Adults were involved in prayer vigils, men's breakfasts and women's socials. Our AMF Missionaries, who are part of the founding body, have spent Sunday afternoons at the Shelton Youth Detention Facility the past two years. Twice a month two men hold bible studies at the prison. We hope many of you were on hand to share our Christmas Tableau and to rejoice and celebrate the birthday of Jesus Christ.

The Christmas season provides a chance to gather and sing carols and to sample the goodies that appear during the holidays. It reminds us of folks on this planet who do not have our material advantages, our freedom to worship publicly or our access to communications we take for granted. In 2005, we purchased more small radios that can receive short wave and other programs. Because many of the areas served by Far East Broadcasting Co do not have access to either electricity or batteries, the radios are equipped with cranks that can be wound to receive enough power to play the radio 30+ minutes. This gives people a chance to hear about their Creator who loves them. Experience of sending 40 such radios to Cambodia two years ago shows many people gather around one radio to listen, so this project benefits many.






