




2013 HICC Honored Citizens



Citizen of the Year SANDY MURPHY

HICC Historical Preservation Committee

HPC has completed our 2nd year in preparation of the 2014 "Centennial Celebration" of the Hall. We continued on with our main goals of creating a library system of old records found in the basement and contributions from different islanders, converting HICC minutes from 1933 forward into pdf files to be presented to historical societies, fundraising to help finance and complete improvements to the Hall and parking areas and forming subcommittees to work on the actual events for the celebration

The HPC team working with chairperson Sandy Murphy consists of Bill Burrows, Gary Benz, Judie Schaaf and Jim Irving. This team of five has developed and shaped our vision for the centennial. We have embraced suggestion and ideas given to us by islanders and have enjoyed the process of working together as a well oiled team.

This year we were able to complete the painting of the exterior of the hall, build a storage building to house the Garden Club's Farmers Market and Apple Squeeze equipment, expand, grade and gravel the parking lot, replace the front porch lighting, and replace the back hand railing to meet current ADA standards. Our fundraising efforts have been supported by local business who have ties to the island and by islanders past and present whose donations have helped with the goals of improving the hall for its centennial. We want the hall to enter its 100th year looking and functioning at its best. By being good stewards we hope to continue to set the standards for the hall's next 100 years! HARSTINE ISLAND GARDEN CLUB

Twenty six years ago Denise Bechwith and Jim Anderson, Barbara and the late Damon Lajune had a vision - let's host a farmers market at the Community Hall. The market averaged twenty five vendors per Saturday this past year and that doesn't count the non profits. The market now has its own Island coffee roasting company. With our own local musicians jamming most Saturdays it makes for a lively, engaging market. We have room for more vendors! We charge a nominal fee and assign vendor sites. Market managers are Donna and Charlie Strandberg (528-7150).

You'll be glad to know that Jim Anderson is keeping his hand in the Apple Squeeze and this year we had a little cider left over that went home with those who stayed late to clean up. Jim has already overhauled the equipment in preparation for Squeeae 2014. Arlen Morris continues to out do herself on arranging the activities inside the Hall. Apple Squeeze Saturday is always busy!

The Club has had a busy year. We've hosted a number of programs - including a soil/greenhouse specialist, a mason bee expert showing us how to make inexpensive mason bee houses, Eric Hagen from WSU Extension talked about pest control and micro nutrients. We held our third annual wreath making class in November, John Moss talked about how to raise vegetables for the table, how to choose seed and have successive plantings. Bill Shoaf taught us more on caring for and pruning our fruit trees and we'll soon have a cheese maker put on a demonstration. The Pie Contest didn't do that well. but we're going to do it again after revamping. Several of us cleaned up the gardens at the Hall and are planning another spruce up. We ended the year at the Strandbergs with a Christmas potluck. Arlen had us making table decorations for the Hall - which afterwards went to Shelton Rehab.

We've got a lot more planned for the coming year and - oh yes - we welcome off islanders to join us. Our dues are \$12/year. Let us know if there's a subject you'd like us to cover and we'll try to find a presenter.

A great German philosopher, Friedrich Nietzche, declared, "Without music, life would be a mistake." This short statement gives us something to ponder as we set priorities in our lives. Few of us go through many days without music touching us in some way. Therefore, it seems not only logical, but imperative that the people of Mason County and Harstine Island continue supporting their excellent regional choir, Harstine Island Community Choir.

Our community is indeed fortunate. The director for ten years, Elizabeth Berndt, has had choral directing education in the U.S., and at the Conservatory of Music in Stuttgart, Germany. She brings out the best in the 50 volunteer singers who present two concerts a year at three different venues. Concert themes vary widely and can be quite complex. Recent themes included songs from Native Americans, compositions based on poems by Robert Frost, sea shanties from sailors, and Celtic Christmas songs. Often the choir is joined by guest musicians. Whatever the focus, the music is beautifully presented, and audiences have responded with ever increasing attendance.

The choir's mission is to bring music to everyone in Mason County and surrounding areas. Each year the choir expands the musical opportunities available. They have sung for Friends of the Library, tree lighting ceremonies, Music in the Park, and Allyn Days. They also sponsor learning opportunities, such as Humanities of Washington music presentations and this Spring, the first annual Mason County Youth Music Competition, called Music to Our Ears.

Currently, the choir is preparing the Spring concern, "Sentimental Journey," which features popular songs from 1910 to 1955 - the "Golden Age" of song. This was a time of radio, Broadway shows, Hollywood musicals, and even "live" performances in homes across the nation via small black and white TV's. The driving force making this music so memorable was some of the best composers, arrangers and lyricists the world has known. Today, nearly 100 years from the start of this era, Inving Berlin's "White Christmas" and "God Bless America," Judy Garland's singing "Somewhere Over the Rainbow," and Broadway musical songs like "Some Enchanted Evening" still resonate in our hearts. "Sentimental Journey" is pure entertainment. Experience a Harstine Island Community Choir funfilled performance the third weekend in May -Friday, May 16, 7to8:30pm @ the Northside Baptist Church - Saturday, May 17, 3-4:30pm @ St. Hugh Epíscopal Church - Sunday, May 18, 3-4:30pm @ Harstine Island Community Hall.

The concerts are not ticketed, but the choir appreciates donations to help cover expenses.

If you are yearning for musical opportunities in your life, the Harstine Island Community Choir welcomes you to join them. Rehearsals are Sunday afternoons at the Community Hall from 4-6pm. THE WOMEN'S CLUB HAD ITS BEGINNING IN 1916 WHEN NINE ISLAND WOMEN MET FOR AN AFTERNOON OF SEWING AND NEWS. TODAY THE WOMEN'S CLUB - WITH 120 MEMBERS - IS DEDICATED TO PROVIDING A SOCIAL VENUE FOR ISLAND WOMEN AND TO SERVING ISLAND NEEDS AND THOSE OF THE LARGER COMMUNITY. MEETINGS INCLUDE SPECIAL LUNCHEONS, GAMES, AUCTIONS, AND EDUCATIONAL AND ENTERTAINING PROGRAMS.

FUND-RAISING IS AN IMPORTANT PART OF HIWC ACTIVITIES. THE CLUB AND THE JUDY & CHARLES CASE SCHOLARSHIP ENDOWMENT PROVIDE FUNDS FOR CONTINUING EDUCATION FOR ISLAND STUDENTS. FUNDS ARE CHANNELED TO THE COMMUNITY CLUB FOR UPKEEP AND IMPROVEMENTS TO THE HALL. MONTHLY CONTRIBUTIONS ARE ALSO MADE TO LOCAL FOOD BANKS AND THE TURNING POINTE WOMEN'S SHELTER.

Before the bridge was opened there were few permanent residents on the Island. Their local social life pretty much centered on the Grange and the Community Club. After the bridge and during the 1970s and 80s people began to move here in increasing numbers. One result was a growing community club membership and new blood with varying interests one of these being the Community Theater.

In the reminiscences of our founder, Shirl Larson, she recalls how a gentle request of Thora Seward to have "some theater on this island" prompted the beginnings. In 1972 the seventeen member Women's Club presented a Christmas show followed by a Spring show cobbled together with skits and poems written or adapted by Shirl - who was a long time actress in Vaudeville, on stage and television before coming to Harstine - these continued and grew to annual events.

The group has grown and matured over the years since, producing shows from Vaudeville skits to full blown Broadway productions the likes of 'The Sound of Music'. Back stage clutter from stage sets and costumes became such a problem by 1987 that the Theater Club undertook the task of excavating under the west end of the Community Hall and constructing the storage space now existing prop room, heated costume room and the great room for Community Hall general use. All of the lumber used was cut and milled on the Island by Glen Yates (with a lot of help).

Over the years the club has added lighting, sound systems, a control booth, enlarged the permanent stage and temporary stage. The Theater Club shares in Community Club annual expenses, insurance, taxes, etc. The Club also provides an arts related scholarship.




The Harstine Island Community Hall is located at 3371 E Harstine Island Rd N (left at the bridge and three miles north).

Harstine Islander



The Harstine Island Community Hall was built in 1914. The ground where the Hall is located was donated by Andrew Johnson, Hilma Wingert's father. For the lumber, the men went along the beach and fell trees that were easy to get out. August Carlson also donated trees for lumber. Jim Edgbert, Arthur Wingert, and Alan McKay used two teams of horses to haul the logs out of the woods. Then they were rafted and towed by the "Marie", owned by Raymond and John Haskell, and the "Levina", owned by Ed Cowan, to the saw-mill at Taylor Bay. When the lumber was finished, it was towed back to the Island in a scow by the "Marie". Horses and a wagon were used to haul it from the bay to the location of the Hall.

The main carpenters were the Sund brothers - John, Bill and Oscar - from Stadium (near Grapeview). Islanders taking part in the building were: Lee Carlson, Ed Wilson, John Wilson, Arlo Wingert, Arthur Wingert and Paul Hitchcock. This was just for the main Hall. The dining room and kitchen were added later. Potluck picnics often went along with the work parties. In 1916, the lean-to, consisting of dining room and kitchen, were added by Bill Sayers and helpers Tony Goetsch, Wilson Carlson and several others. The old large black camp stove used in the kitchen for years was donated by Mark Reed of Simpson Logging Company. The kitchen was small and dark with a steep flight of steps going down the outside on the south end of the building and leading across a little stream to a couple of out-houses. There was no water in the Hall and it was lighted by gas lamps. When there was a "doings", water and wood were brought from home or borrowed from neighbors. There were many doings those good old days with people coming by boat from Agate, Stadium and Vaughn. All these dances were to raise money for the stage, sealing the kitchen and dining room, and a maple hardwood floor. The proceeds also later bought a 4 cycle gas engine light plant, which was underneath the Hall. It popped away and quite often stopped and the lights would go out, to the delight of the dancers.
