
### 2016 CITIZEN OF THE YEAR AWARD

**Don Nichols** – Although Don has passed away from us he has left a lasting impression on us and all of the many things he did for his community is much appreciated. Don and his wife arrived on the Island in 1990. For many years Don arranged for and organized the waiters and the set up at the annual spaghetti dinner. He volunteered to drive people to their appointments, helped with the aluminum scrap for recycling and participated in removing tires from a piece of property where a tire garden was not wanted. His practice of precision in the art of bonsai led to teaching it at the first island craft workshop. 

## Women's Club

In 1916 nine women on Harstine Is. started meeting in one another's homes to sew and visit. This was the beginning of the Harstine Is. Women's Club. Today with 105 members we hold monthly meetings at the Hall; we still visit and the sewing group still meets in one another's homes apart from our regular meeting.

Last April we celebrated our centennial anniversary. A skit was put on telling a little of our history and most of us were surprised to learn how much money we've donated through the years with fund raisers. Women's Club in conjunction with the Judy and Charles Chase Memorial fund, provides scholarships for continuing education for many Island residents of all ages, on a yearly basis. We make funds available to Community Club for upkeep and improvements when needed. Monthly donations are made to the Methodist Food Bank, Saint's Pantry, and Turning Pointe, which is a safe place for women and children. Collections are also taken monthly for the Pioneer Food Bank. We also provide Memorial luncheons at the Hall for family and friends' of deceased Island residents, upon family request.

Fund raising events include our Women's Club booth at the Saturday Farmer's Market, featuring logo sportswear, wine glasses and mugs, as well as Island maps, cookbooks and license plate frames. We also put on a Holiday House Bazaar the Saturday after Thanksgiving, showcasing many local artisans with their hand crafted wares. And the Friday of Labor Day weekend we host a delicious Taco Bar Dinner.

Meetings are held monthly (except July) on the first Thursday of the month. Social time begins at 11:30, lunch at noon, followed by a program at 12:30 and ending with a short business meeting. Lunch is usually a brown bag with dessert provided or one of our theme lunches or outings. All women are invited to join this wonderful organization.




## Garden Club
