

The hall has reached the grand old age of 104 and it still remains the hub of activity on our island. According to the Declaration of the Hall and Mission Statement: "The Harstine Island Community Hall promotes educational, cultural, and social opportunities for our community, our off-island neighbors, and for all the new friends we have yet to meet. The Club actively manages and preserves the Community Hall, respecting the storied history of the Hall and the Island while looking forward to the future."

Keeping this in mind, we encourage the island residents to join or renew their memberships to help with the continuing upgrades and maintenance of the hall and its grounds. While your membership does not require anything more than paying your yearly dues (now, from January to December), we encourage you to join our active volunteers who dedicate their time and effort to preserve, not only the hall but also our sense of community, being the lifeblood of this preservation effort. The hall does not stand only as a monument, but continues to serve our ever-increasing numbers. We appreciate and encourage your participation in our continuing efforts to protect, preserve and prepare our hall for the future.

Your membership dues and generous donations have made our past projects become realities. Please consider adding a donation(s) for our on-going repairs and renovations. This year the focus is on providing a generator for the hall, which acts as the island's Emergency Center, in case of a disaster.

On-going Expenses include: Electricity, phone, Wi Fi, heating oil, furnace maintenance, well maintenance, and well water monthly testing, septic pumping, propane, insurance, storm repairs, parking lot maintenance, exterior & interior painting, light bulbs, paper products, garbage service, safety upgrades, kitchen upgrade, hall cleaning, pest management, yard maintenance at hall and entrance to island.



Historical Preservation

Family History Project

Last April was the official beginning of the HICC family History Project and, as you might recall, there was an article featuring it in the last newsletter. In May, I started in earnest by handing out cards outlining the parameters of this project, while working the Community Club Booth at the Farmers Market. It created quite the buzz, as people verbally shared many of their stories with me. It was the start of the summer (after a long soggy spring) and everyone was beginning to enjoy their long hot summer season and busy autumn. At the time, I promised that I would remind you all during the winter when you would have more time to reminisce, write your story down, and send it to me. Well, that time has come (drum roll please)!

Some of the guidelines are the same; to write your personnel story of your family's coming to the island, how you found the island, your community involvement, the joys of living here in this wonderful place, and including a few photos. Also, telling when & where you came to live on the island, previous family generations on Harstine, favorite island memories and where you came from in your prior life, etc.


After speaking with you, I would like to expand those parameters to include telling the history of your land. We know the first people here were Tribal, but from the mid 1870's forward it would be most interesting to research (through the tax-rolls) who lived on your place before you came to the island. Just imagine how differently they all lived, shaping your land into what it has become today. What a gift this would be to your family by increasing their knowledge and attachment to the island; not to mention, all of you who might read this "some-day book".

Another thing I would like to clarify is that this history project is for everyone who lives here (or has lived here), regardless if you are new to the island or have been here for generations. After the bridge was built in 1969; the population exploded with the creation of Harstine Pointe and in general with people moving in all around the island. Time marches on...and everyone's story is important!



Inquiring Minds Series

The Inquiring Minds/Conversations series is a community service project sponsored by the Harstine Island Community Club in cooperation with the Humanities Washington Speakers Bureau, a state-wide organization funded by the National Endowment for the Humanities, Washington State Legislature and private donations.

Speakers are chosen by vote of Community Club members from the Speakers Bureau roster.



The roster includes many diverse and engaging speakers covering a variety of topics.

The goal is to spark conversation and critical thinking.

Each year programs are offered the final Sundays of January, February, and March at 1:45 at the Community Hall. Presentations are free (donations accepted) and open to the public.

Jarrell's Cove Cemetery



Did you know that the cemetery is 121 years old?

In April of 1894 Robert Jarrell was buried on the land just back of his house. At that time Philura, the first white woman on Harstine, erected a monument, and planted four small fir trees around the grave. The trees are now covered with English Ivy and well over 175 feet high.

In February 1897, Philura deeded one half acre of land on what is known as the Robert Jarrell homestead the same to be used exclusively by the public as a public burying ground, to Jacob Wingert and all residents of Harstine Island. Philura was buried on Easter Sunday in 1913, Jake Wingert had the name of Mrs. Jarrell placed on the monument she had erected for her husband. The Jarrells are buried there in the southwest corner of the cemetery.

The care of individual graves has been left to the families of the deceased, with general care of the cemetery being done by islanders. Over the years, it was enlarged, surveyed, a fence built the Memorial Garden established for cremated remains, and in the 1970s a Cemetery Board evolved.

Prior to Memorial Day each year, a group of volunteers gather to clean up the grounds, removing the downfall from over the winter, and mowing the grass. On Memorial Day weekend, American flags are put on the graves of the island's veterans to honor their service.

This year, the cleanup date is **Saturday May 19th** please come and join us, bring gloves, garden tools, pruners, blowers, and such. The time will be announced later.

On **Saturday May 26th** we will have a ceremony formally announcing Jarrell Cove's Cemetery as a **Mason County Place of Historic Interest** and presenting new informational signs relating the story of the cemetery. Please come and join us in recognizing this accomplishment.




Harstine Island Women's Club

The Harstine Island Women's Club is a group of women, 100 strong, working together for the good of the community. And we have fun while doing it.

For 101 years Women's Club has had many fundraising events to benefit community residents. Money is donated monthly to; Methodist food bank, Saint's Pantry, and Turning Pointe. Donations are collected monthly for Pioneer food bank. The Community Club is the recipient of funds for upkeep and improvements to the Hall, when need arises. On the second Saturday of August a Kid's Carnival is put on at the Hall. Women's Club, in conjunction with the Judy and Charles Chase endowment provide scholarships to Island residents for education and to people of all ages. Memorial luncheons are provided, at the Hall, for family and friends' of deceased Island residents, at no cost and upon family request.

Our fund raising events include selling logo sportswear, wine glasses and mugs, Island maps, cookbooks and license plate frames at the Saturday Market. The Saturday after Thanksgiving Holiday House at the Hall is a favorite Bazaar with local artisans showcasing many beautiful hand crafted items. Meetings are held monthly, on the first Thursday of the month, except July, which we skip. Social time begins at 11:30, lunch at noon, followed by a program at 12:30 and ending with a short business meeting. Lunch is usually a brown bag with dessert provided or one of our theme lunches or outings. All Island women are invited to join this fun Club.

Membership is open to anyone living on or off Island and our annual dues are \$15.


