We were happy that through the Chase Scholarship Fund we were able to give a total of \$20,575.00 in scholarships in 2021. Thank you all the committee members involved in making this happen.

In February our membership collected small toys, cookie gift certificates from Olympic Bakery, plus \$126 in cash to donate to Pioneer School District's student awards program.

Harstine Island Garden Club 2021

The Harstine Island Garden Club is a group of men and women of all ages who gather to share garden knowledge and fellowship. The club has 3 focuses; meetings and education, sponsoring the Farmers and Indoor Markets and the Pioneer School greenhouse and garden restoration.

We meet on the 2nd Tuesday of every month in a variety of different locations.

During these meetings we host speakers, discuss relevant garden topics, take field trips, and hold workshops in preparation for our annual plant sale.

You do not need to live on the island or possess a lot of garden knowledge or experience to become a member.

After a pause in 2020 the Farmers and Indoor Markets are back. We had a successful summer season, meeting every Saturday. In 2019, we adopted the Pioneer School greenhouse and garden restoration the space was in severe disrepair and no longer usable by the school.

The Garden Club project team initially worked in coordination with the Pioneer School administration on initiatives, ideas, and priorities for healthy outdoor learning. Despite the setbacks and restrictions in 2020/21, we managed to make tremendous progress in restoring and revitalizing the space.

Now school is once again in session, the space is being used and incorporated into teaching plant-based science, healthful/sustainable food projects, and other healthy outdoor “green” curriculum.

Pickup Trash on the Island

Insert Map here: The Harstine Island Community Club (HICC) entered into a 2 year Adopt-a-Road (A&R) agreement with Mason County. Under the agreement HICC committed to:

- Pick up trash on North Island Drive from milepost 1 to 4.6 Harstine Point. The Kiwanis have an agreement covering milepost 1 to the bridge.
- Pickup trash on South Island Drive from milepost 1 to 3.6 (intersection with East Island Drive) The Kiwanis have an agreement covering milepost 1 to the bridge.
- Clean the roads adopted at least 4 times a year.
- Provide safety training to volunteers
- Ensure volunteers wear safety gear (vests and hard hats)
- Document/record clean ups conducted
- Maintain a contact person/group leader (Pat Brunner volunteered to be the HICC contact person for the first 2 years.)



Community Club 2nd Century Fund

Since 1914 when island neighbors came together to build a small building for an athletic club which later became the Harstine Community Hall, the community spirit has been the cornerstone of Harstine Island. In 2014 community members continued the tradition by forming the HICC 2nd Century Building Fund to meet the future needs of our community. This last couple of years have been tough on everyone but the kindness and generosity of Harstine Islanders just won't be dampened by hard times.

During August and September of this year Islanders came together to clear and level the building site for our new auxiliary building. Volunteers gathered and chipped the branches from the uprooted trees; cut the root balls off to burn with the rest of the debris; and cut and split the trunks. The split wood was sold at our Annual Donor Event held on September 24th. We had a fantastic party where we raised \$48,000 from the silent auction and other generous cash donations. The 2nd Century Committee extends their sincerest thanks to all who donated goods for the silent auction and to those who made cash gifts. Plans are being drawn up by our Architect that will be used to obtain a building permit so that we can proceed with the raising of our new, grand auxiliary building.

Continue the momentum to build the auxiliary building by supporting the 2nd Century Building Fund monetarily. Tax deductible donations can be made in most any form: cash; sustaining monthly donation; legacy by naming the fund in your will; creating a memorial to a loved one; donations of appreciated stocks and mutual funds; or as a part of your RMD (required minimum distribution) from an IRA or 401K. At the time of the covid lock down Harstine Island Theatre Club was in the midst of rehearsals for “The Odd Couple” (female version). Everyone was working hard on character development, props, sets, and all aspects of the production. It all came to a screeching halt in mid-March 2020. Originally scheduled for April 2020 we optimistically moved it to June 2020. Ho hum. Then we thought all would be well by September 2020. Nope. Maybe we could still do a little something for Christmas. You know, some skits, songs, and Santa. We all know that didn't be happen either in 2020 or 2021. Amazingly enough all the folks involved in “The Odd Couple” (female version), are still on board for staging the show when the restrictions loosen for large groups. We are now hoping for March 2022. This has been a trying two years for all of us, but we will get through it and once again commune together at the beautiful and historical Harstine Island Community Hall.

Historian Report

The last 15 months have shaped and affected all our lives due to the ongoing worldwide pandemic, COVID 19. Harstine Island is just a small dot on the globe but very large in our hearts. The community hall remained closed with the Garden Club's Farmer's Market opening over the Memorial Day weekend in the parking lot. The Community Club had a soft opening in July and August with masks required, bringing your own food and beverages. In September due to COVID delta variant the HICC meeting was held in the parking lot. There was no meeting in October. In November and December meetings and programs were held without food and with a mask mandate.

With the hall closure came the many Hall Renovations: including main hall - hardwood floor refinished, theater seats removed and reupholstered, seat frames cleaned and stained, risers cleaned and painted, one riser removed and floor patched and painted to provide storage space for table racks, window trim installed and stained, and stage upgraded; kitchen/dining room - cabinets refinished, new hardware installed, wall sheet rocked and painted, wrapped and stained windows, chair rail installed and stained, recycle cabinet built; bathrooms – painted, upgraded and redecorated; basement – new upright freezer, 2nd fireproof filing cabinet, and new lighting installed. The grounds and parking lot were also improved: trees and brush cleared, trails added, site for future building prepped, and Wi-Fi updated.

Last year the HICC “Person of the Year” and Citizens of the Year” awards were not given. This year a collective honor was awarded to the many volunteers who have taken the opportunity of the hall's closure to make renovations to the hall and grounds. “MANY HANDS MADE IMPROVEMENTS DURING PANDEMIC 2020-2021” plaques are posted in the hall, along with a full list of improvements and the volunteers who accomplished them. Many other changes happened as well. The Collective was formed and looks forward to becoming an official club under the umbrella of HICC in the future. There are two newly formed independent organizations “Fire Adapted Community - Harstine Island”, Hi PIE - Harstine Island Pitch In Everyone. Also, Mason County Public Utility District and HICC have formed a 2 year Adopt-A-Road agreement to pick up roadside litter on both North Island Drive and South Island Drive.

On a personal note, I will be giving up the position of HICC Historian at the end of 2022. I first took over the position from Eleanor in 2009 and have found it a very rewarding experience. This last summer I had applied for and received the generous monetary gift of financing for a color document scanner from Sierra Pacific Foundation, with the purpose of digitally scanning and preserving our historical documents. This coming year will be dedicated to this purpose as my parting gift to our community. I am pleased to announce that Rick Calvin has joined me as historian-in-training. Although he is new to the island, he comes with a great resume having worked on the board of the Mason County Historical Commission for the last 10 years.
